

### **Certificate III Tourism**

*Marni Naa Pudni* – Welcome to all! (in Kaurna language). Students who undertook the 'Advanced Tourism' short course this term were not only armed with the basic skills required to commence a career pathway in Tour Guiding, but also equipped with a well-rounded knowledge of local Australian Indigenous Culture – including Kaurna language.

During the course, students experienced an excursion to Tauondi College where they were educated in pre and post-colonial history as well as taken through the College's on-site gallery featuring artefacts, artwork and native foods, hosted by Aboriginal Facilitator, Thomas Nowak.

The course concluded with a mini graduation where students presented their learning through oral presentation and foods they had made incorporating Australian native ingredients – the kangaroo sausage rolls were definitely a crowd favourite! Guest performers added to the graduation with a

Welcome to Country performed by Ngarrindjeri Elder, Unlce Moogie, followed by traditional dance which had students up and participating.

This short course was not only a celebration of culture but also a celebration of the senses with students sampling their herbal teas, cooking bush tucker, listening to dreaming stories, observing art and immersing themselves in dance.







### **Creative Arts - Exhibition**

## **MTA Open Day**



The Motor Trade Association (MTA) Open Day was held this term for students interested in an automotive pathway. MTA staff delivered several short demonstrations outlining different aspects of the automotive field. Students were given the opportunity to manually turn an electric motor and produce voltage shown on a screen, indicating how much energy they were creating. They were also shown how to run different sets of diagnostics on truck motors to detect problems reducing labour costs and ensuring the trucks are running as efficiently as possible to reduce emissions. Spray painting, panel beating and tyre fitting demonstrations completed the tour giving insight into other potential pathways relating to the automotive industry.


Points were awarded for participation and wins as students moved from game to game.
